10:50 – 11:50 am Sanctuary	Plenary Session: "De-ICE Virginia: Breaking ties between local law enforcement and federal immigration enforcement" Notwithstanding a large increase in ICE arrests in the community, most ICE arrests in Virginia take place inside of local jails. The arrest-to-deportation pipeline affects any immigrant who is booked into a jail, no matter how minor their charges. While some of the relevant laws are made by the General Assembly in Richmond, most of the relevant policies are made and administered at the discretion of local officials – elected county sheriffs or Regional Jail Board members – who are not accustomed to being the targets of public pressure campaigns. This plenary session will discuss advocacy campaigns across the Commonwealth, and highlight some of the pressure points where the jail-to-deportation pipeline can be choked off. A national expert
	from the ACLU will give a perspective on trends, campaigns and creative policy ideas in the other 49 states.
